

- Type all requested information; incomplete sections will delay processing.
- Print two copies of these forms, then sign and date where indicated. Keep one full copy, then . . .
- Submit the other complete copy to the English Department office, 180 Rigby Hall. There is no hurry with submission (you have about a month): we directors will wait until we have a large collection of applications before beginning interviews, probably in early January. Application deadline: December 20th—the end of fall semester 2023.
- After an in-person interview with a director, you'll receive an email notification of your acceptance via your BYU-I email.
- Applying does not necessarily guarantee acceptance; some applications may be declined (see below).
- Upon being notified, respond to our email by confirming its receipt and your acceptance.
- Wait until we email you that the University is ready to accept and process your deposit. We're arranging this now, and it may be a little while before we can collect funds. As soon as it's arranged, we'll email you. Payment may be made via your BYU–I student account portal or in person at the Cashier's Office (130 Kimball Bldg.). Specify payment is for the British Literary Academic Tour. \$700 deposit secures your spot on the tour; deposit is non-refundable.
- Space is limited. If tour fills quickly, students may be put on a waiting list. We will take as many students as the University, Department, and tour deem prudent.
- Tentative tour dates: August 10th September 3rd/4th (depending on flight).
- Note that this window may shift a few days either way depending on flight pricing and hotel availability. (Paris is hosting the 2024 Paralympics from August 28th September 8th, right at the time we'd be visiting, so we may have to get creative with scheduling.)
- We'll leave from, and return to, the Salt Lake City International Airport (SLC); travel beyond—whether via airline, shuttle/bus, or car—is the student's sole responsibility.
- Cost: \$4700, which includes airfare from/to SLC, ground transportation, accommodations, required entrance fees, international health insurance, and at least two meals per day. Current cost was derived from the now-finalized 2023 tour. We will manage funds very carefully and transparently. The tour neither retains unspent student monies nor carries them over to the following year; all monies collected for the 2024 tour will be expended on participants.
- Cost excludes tuition, domestic health insurance, passport fee, course books/supplies, and personal spending money.

Students on any track may apply, but must be in good academic standing and have an ecclesiastical endorsement for spring semester 2024. If graduating in December (Fall) 2023, April (Winter) 2024, or July (Spring) 2024, students must re-apply to the University as "non-matriculating" students in order to travel under the auspices of the University and register for courses.

PART 4: LEGAL AGREEMENTS

ACADEMIC AGREEMENT

Participation in the British Literary Tour, conducted by BYU–Idaho and the English Department, is done on a voluntary basis without compulsion or coercion, and is not a mandatory class requirement. However, if accepted into the program, students are required to take at least three credits total.

MANDATORY DOMESTIC HEALTH INSURANCE

All students who participate in the tour are enrolled in an international travel health and life insurance policy offered by GeoBlue International Travel Insurance, the cost for which is included with the tour. The policy is active during the time the group is outside the U.S. However, since GeoBlue is only valid outside the U.S., students are still required to maintain adequate domestic insurance as stipulated by BYU–Idaho for summer term 2024.

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

BYU–Idaho is committed to providing a learning atmosphere that reasonably accommodates academically qualified persons with disabilities. However, the Americans with Disabilities Act does not apply to foreign countries: some sites, events, activities, and forms of transportation abroad will not be ADA-compliant, or they may be somehow/somewhat inaccessible. Additionally, international study programs are physically, emotionally, and mentally demanding. For example, a program could have daily itineraries during which walking up to 10 miles/day may be required. Other conditions may include, but are not limited to, standing for long periods of time, walking on cobblestones or other uneven surfaces, or walking though inclement weather, extreme heat, or humidity. Students with particular concerns are strongly encouraged to discuss personal requirements with tour directors before applying.

NONDISCRIMINATION STATEMENT

Admission to BYU–Idaho is nondiscriminatory: the University admits persons without regard to gender, race, creed, religion, or national origin who meet the University's academic requirements, who agree to abide by the Honor Code and Dress and Grooming Standards, who agree to abide by program-specific requirements and policies, and who are otherwise qualified.

TERMINATION FROM PROGRAM

The University reserves the absolute right to immediately terminate a student's participation in the program if

- it is found that a student applied and/or registered under false pretenses
- a student failed to abide by the terms of the BYU-I Honor Code, or
- a student refused or failed to follow security, safety, or health instructions given by tour directors

If the termination takes place *before* the starting date of the program, the student will be subject to cancellation fees. If the termination takes place *after* the starting date of the program:

- no program fees or tuition for the semester/term of the program will be refunded
- the student will receive course grades based on the work completed at the time of termination
- the student will no longer be allowed to participate in the tour
- the student will no longer be allowed to live in BYU-I arranged housing abroad
- the student will be sent home from the tour at his/her own expense
